

The Vicar Writes:

This month millions of Christians worldwide, of every denomination, will once again join in with *Thy Kingdom Come*, a prayer initiative between Ascension and Pentecost (29th May to 8th June), to pray for the nation to know Jesus Christ. It is a time to seek the empowering of the Holy Spirit, that we may be effective witnesses to Jesus Christ.

Praying for others to know Jesus is one of the most powerful things we can do. Persistent prayer for others brings transformation to their lives. As Paul writes: 'Devote yourselves to prayer, being watchful and thankful. And pray for us, too, that God may open a door for our message, so that we may proclaim the mystery of Christ, for which I am in chains. Pray that I may proclaim it clearly, as I should.' (Colossians 4: 2-4).

As Paul says, consistent praying for others involves discipline ('be devoted') and responding to what God is already doing in people's lives ('being watchful and thankful'). We can pray for 'open doors' to point people to Jesus and what He can mean in their lives. We all have opportunities to do this, as even Paul prayed as a prisoner in chains!!

Thy Kingdom Come encourages us to choose five people who we can pray for regularly. Why not ask God to guide you, as you settle on five names and commit to praying for them daily, perhaps by using the following prayer:

'Loving Father, in the face of Jesus Christ your light and glory have blazed forth.

Send your Holy Spirit that I may share with my friends the life of your Son and your love for all.

Strengthen me as a witness to that love as I pledge to pray for them, for your name's sake. Amen.'



Holy Week and Easter 2025

Revd Jess shares a roundup of our Easter celebrations at St Saviour's.

This year's Holy Week and Easter celebrations were both wonderfully joyful & deeply moving, as together we journeyed with Jesus from the excitement of Palm Sunday through to the pain of Good Friday and beyond to the elation of the empty tomb on Easter Day.



We started our celebrations, by welcoming 75 children (and their teachers) to our Easter Experience – an immersive and interactive telling of the journey Jesus took in his final days – which was appreciated by those who visited and those who volunteered.

We then, on a gloriously spring morning, marked Palm Sunday, by beginning our worship outside, and processing into church, in triumphant song, for the remainder of our worship.

On the Monday of Holy Week, 25 children (and their parents/carers) came into church for our Easter Crafts event, where they created different arts projects, reflecting the different parts of Holy Week, as well as ending with a special story read ______ by Revd Jess.



On the Wednesday, Aly led a beautifully reflective Stations of the Cross, and Revd Jess led the Mothers Union in a Holy Week Meditation. These were quickly followed by our

Eucharist on Maundy
Thursday – when we
remembered Jesus'
instruction to wash one
another's feet and share in
Communion. The service
ended in darkness and
silence, as we remembered
Jesus being taken away by
the authorities and his
disciples abandoning him and
leaving him alone, with the
church being stripped bare of
all its finery.



On Good Friday, we gathered for the last hour of the cross, with music and reflections.



And then on Easter Day, just shy of 100 people came together to celebrate the wonder of the resurrection in an uplifting service, which was ended by an Easter Egg Hunt (complete with visit from the Easter Bunny!), a Chocolate Feast and the results of the Easter Egg Competition.

Whit Walks

This month, Manchester Cathedral is inviting parishioners to participate in a traditional Whit Walk, falling this year on Monday 26th May. A joyful parade of clergy and parishioners along with brass bands and drums will process through the streets of the city, honouring a tradition which was first established over 200 years ago in the North West.



The history of Manchester's Whit Walks

The week following the festival of Pentecost was traditionally known as Whitsuntide, and today, this week usually coincides with school half terms. In the Victorian period, Whitsuntide became a general holiday period for factory workers, with the mills closing for the week and workers taking canal boat holidays or cheap outings by rail. Historically, it was a common time for young people to wear white for baptisms, and so Whit(e) Friday became a day for them to parade through the streets in witness to their new faith. The marches were also seen as a diversion from labour in Manchester's factories and mills. Children from Anglican Sunday schools would march on Whit Monday, whilst those from Roman Catholic schools would walk on Whit Friday. The 'scholars' would be treated to new clothes for the occasion, and clergy or church officers would carry baskets of flowers and banners, with brass bands leading the processions. The Whit Walks continued through the twentieth century throughout Manchester, Tameside, Saddleworth and even parts of West Yorkshire. Christians today pay tribute to this strong Mancunian tradition by coming together to share their faith in a traditional walk of witness.


9.30am Assemble in Cathedral Gardens (behind Manchester Cathedral)

Ascension Day



40 days after Easter comes Ascension Day. These are the 40 days during which the Risen Christ appeared again and again to His disciples, following His death and resurrection. (*Matthew 28; Mark 16; Luke 24; and John 20.*)

The Gospels give us little of Christ's teachings and deeds during those 40 days. Jesus was seen by many of His disciples: on the road to Emmaus, by the Sea of Galilee, in houses, etc. He strengthened and encouraged His disciples, and at last opened their eyes to all that the Scriptures had promised about the Messiah. Jesus also told them that as the Father had sent Him, He was now going to send them – to all corners of the earth, as His witnesses.


Surely the most tender, moving 'farewell' in history took place on Ascension Day. Luke records the story with great poignancy: 'When Jesus had led them out to the vicinity of Bethany, He lifted up His hands – and blessed them.'

As Christmas began the story of Jesus' life on earth, so Ascension Day completes it, with His return to His Father in heaven. Jesus' last act on earth was to bless His disciples. He and they had a bond as close as could be: they had just lived through three tumultuous years of public ministry and miracles – persecution and death – and resurrection! Just as we part from our nearest and dearest by still looking at them with love and memories in our eyes, so exactly did Jesus: 'While He was blessing them, He left them and was taken up into heaven.' (Luke 24:50-1) He was not forsaking them, but merely going on ahead to a kingdom which would also be theirs one day: 'I am

ascending to my Father and to your Father, to my God and your God...' (John 20:17)

The disciples were surely the most favoured folk in history. Imagine being one of the last few people on earth to be face to face with Jesus, and have Him look on you with love. No wonder then that Luke goes on: 'they worshipped Him – and returned to Jerusalem with great joy. And they stayed continually at the temple, praising God.' (Luke 24:52,53)

No wonder they praised God! They knew they would see Jesus again one day! 'I am going to prepare a place for you... I will come back and take you to be with me that you also may be where I am.' (John 14:2,3) In the meantime, Jesus had work for them to do: to take the Gospel to every nation on earth.



Prayer for Ascension Day

Dear God, our loving, sending and almighty Father, thank you that because Jesus died, rose and ascended into heaven, You were able to send your Holy Spirit to empower Your disciples then and today. That, equipped by that same Spirit, we can confidently work for Your kingdom to come on earth, as in heaven.

Lord, in these strange, topsy-turvy days, where earthly rulers terrify and destroy and disappoint, we rejoice that You are the Sovereign Lord of all things, and all times, and all places.

You, our God and Father, truly reign. We are Your people. We are secure within Your love and protection. Thank you that at the name of Jesus *every* knee shall ultimately bow - and we pray, thankfully in His name, Amen.

I am having knee replacement surgery on the 24^{th of} April and because I will officially be on sick leave there can be no parish nursing for this time period. A special Eucharist A note from Revd Christine

The Revd Christine will preside and preach at the Sunday Eucharist on 22nd June to mark the 30th anniversary of her ordination as priest and her retirement from active ministry.

All in the month of May

It was:

1300 years ago, on 26th May 725 that the Venerable Bede died. This English Benedictine monk, historian, linguist, translator and teacher is known as 'the father of English history'. He helped to popularise the idea of dating years from the birth of Christ (*Anno Domini* – AD)

200 years ago, on 7th May 1825, that Antonio Salieri died. An Italian composer, he helped to develop operas and taught composers including Liszt, Schubert, Beethoven and Mozart. He was rumoured to have poisoned Mozart, but this was later proven to be false.

125 years ago, on 17th May 1900 that during the Second Boer War, the 217-day Siege of Mafeking was relieved by 2000 British forces and South African volunteers. Colonel Robert Baden-Powell, who led the forces defending Mafeking during the siege, became a national hero, and later founded the Scouting movement.

80 years ago, on 1st May 1945 that German radio announced the death of Adolf Hitler. It was reported he had died a hero's death fighting, but in fact he had committed suicide.

Also 80 years ago, on 8th May 1945 that VE Day took place – marking Victory in Europe at the end of WW2. It was celebrated as a public holiday.

Also 50 years ago, on 27th May 1975 that Dibble's Bridge Coach Crash in Hebden, North Yorkshire took place. 32 people were killed and 13 injured when a coach's brakes failed on a steep hill. It remains the worst road accident in the UK, by fatalities.

Also 30 years ago, on 13th May 1995 that British mountaineer Alison Hargreaves became the first woman to reach the summit of Mount Everest unaided (without bottled oxygen or Sherpas.) She died later that year, in August, in a storm, while attempting to climb K2.

10 years ago, on 22nd May 2015, that the Republic of Ireland became the first country to hold a referendum on whether same-sex marriage should be legalised. It voted to approve, and same-sex marriage became legal in Ireland from that November.
